## IRGS Member Profile: Susan Rienzo

I grew up in Brooklyn, New York in the 50's & 60's. Those were the days of hoola hoops, Elvis, Dick Clark, the Beatles, the Brooklyn Dodgers, and walking to the local soda shop for an Egg Cream; my fondest Brooklyn memories.

I learned little about my Jewish heritage growing up. My grandparents on both sides died before I was born. Neither of my parents knew very much about their family. When I asked questions, my parents responded with only basic information. I learned that my grandfather on my father's side, Samuel **FEINBERG** came from Russia in 1885 after the assassination of the Czar in 1881. He came to America to escape the rampant persecution that followed as well as possible conscription into harsh military service. He, like thousands of others, was looking for a better life in this land of dreams and opportunities.

To be an immigrant though, for some not all, was an embarrassment and stigma that kept family members from talking about their past, particularly my grandfather since he feared he would be forced to return to Russia.

My father was born on the Lower East Side of NY about 1907, with 5 siblings, in the well-known neighborhood of immigrants, pushcarts, and peddlers. My grandfather Samuel was a tailor and together with his sister and brother-in law, they started an underwear company. According to a family story that may never be confirmed, the company failed due to family conflict. The early 1900's were tough and turbulent times in NYC. The American garment industry developed simultaneously with the waves of Eastern European Jewish Immi-

gration. Sweatshops abound, and the fight for the development of unions began and in 1911 there was the infamous "Triangle Shirt Waist Factory Fire."

Like many people in the 70's, I was inspired by "Roots" the famous TV mini-series that seemed to jumpstart a great wave of interest in Genealogy. I had two children of my own and it inspired me to want to know more about my heritage. I questioned my parents, took a few notes, but I knew little on how to find information. Facing this brick wall, my interest waned as I focused on raising my children.

It was not until my husband and I retired in 2005 to Vero Beach where I went to the Indian River Family History Fair and my interest was rekindled.

Since my parents are now gone, I have been actively researching both sides of my family ever since. I know the

advice is to stay focused on one part of your family history but that has been impossible for me. I have been so excited with each discovery that learning everything I can about both sides is so important and each new discovery has led me to research that next step.

With wonderful resources like RAOGK, I was able to receive important information such as the marriage of my grandparents in Boston, MA in 1897, and photos of gravesites. Through my own research, I also recently found a cousin I never knew I had; I thought that could happen only to others and not me. Now, together we are trying to unravel some family mysteries.

My mother in particular had a difficult life of growing up in a Jewish Orphanage in Atlanta, which taught me of the hardships of grow-

ing up without a mother or father. My mother's father, Louis **ROSEN**, I suspect came into New York as a Russian Jewish immigrant. To date, I have not been able to find him in the immigration, or ship lists. I don't know where he married either, but after a few years and a couple of children, he then traveled south, living in Norfolk, VA., for 7 years, establishing a Tailor Shop. He was a restless man. In 1916, for some unknown reason he took his family to Atlanta, GA. He and his wife Lena, now had 8 children: my mother Ida the youngest, 1 ½ years old. When the Influenza Epidemic hit the country, Lena, 34 years of age contracted the disease and died February 18, 1920. He put the children in a Jewish Orphanage, and abandoned them. He ends up in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he remarries a woman by the same name, Lena and now has a stepson and a new daughter, Dorothy.

In 1937, Louis **ROSEN** on his deathbed, reveals his past history to his second family. How devastating that must have been. His sons who grew up in the orphanage, adults now and on their own, learned of his existence from his stepson, and they drove to Cedar Rapids, Iowa to see him. All the children were understandably angry. He died a mere month after their one and only visit, leaving many questions, and so few answers.

Now as a grandmother, I need to document our family history for my children and their children. If I don't do it now, our family heritage might be lost forever.

IRGS has given me so much: allowing me to meet inspiring people, get inspiration to go beyond my brick walls and to learn how to put the information I find together in a cohesive way. This knowledge is priceless. I thank you all for helping and inspiring me.

## Dollarhide's Genealogy Rules

by William Dollarhide

1. Treat the brothers and sisters of your ancestor as equals, even if some of them were in jail.
2. Death certificates are rarely filled in by the person who died.
3. When visiting a funeral home, wear old clothes, no make-up, and look like you have about a week to live. The funeral director will give you anything you ask

for if he thinks you may be a customer soon.

4. The cemetery where your ancestor was buried does not have perpetual care, has no office, is accessible only by a muddy road, has snakes, tall grass, and lots of bugs--and many of the old gravestones are in broken pieces, stacked in a corner under a pile of dirt.

5. A Social Security form SS-5 is better than a birth certificate because few people had anything to do with the information on their own birth certificate.

6. When you contact your home state's vital statistics office and ask if they are "online" and they respond, "on what?" you may have a problem.

# IRGS Minutes - 14 October 2008

The regular monthly meeting of the Indian River Genealogical Society was called to order at 9:35am by Cindy Davis at the Indian River main library with a stated quorum in attendance. She welcomed two guests.

**Minutes Approval:** Minutes of the September 2008 meeting have been published in the newsletter and website. **Minutes of the 8 September 2008 Meeting were unanimously approved.**

**Corresponding Secretary:** Tom Garvey in Diane Chazotte's absence passed around a thank-you card in memory of Dr. John Getz designed by Diane. A get well card has been sent to Sharon Young. Cindy discussed a possible member trip to visit Richard Edwards.

**Treasurer's Report:** Tom Garvey reported our CD balance of \$6,582.89 which includes \$2,108.13 of Martha Dowd scholarship money and a checking account balance of \$5,808.03 which includes \$810.00 in donations in memory of Dr. Getz.

## Committee Reports

**Program Committee:** Cindy Davis reported that a Family History Craft Workshop coordinated by Marge Putzke will be held Saturday, October 18, 2008 from 10:00am to 2:00pm at the Library. The workshop is designed for people to learn how to recycle and repurpose heirlooms into family mementoes and holiday gifts. Cindy announced the programs for November (Recharge Your Roots Through County and Local Histories); December (traditional holiday program including a local Folk Group); January (DNA research), and February (Tricks of the Trade by Drew Smith). The Valentine Seminar hosted by four local genealogical societies, will sell out quickly and space is limited. She urged early sign-up for that reason and to also receive a reduced price of \$35.00 before December 1. Volunteers are needed for the seminar. Maureen Taylor, nationally and internationally known, will be the guest speaker. Her first day will consist of private consultations with a portion of her fee donated to the Society and

her second day devoted to discovering genealogical clues through photographs and planning a family history vacation.

**Education Committee:** Susan Trempe in Diane Macgowan's absence asked those in attendance to complete the membership survey to assist the committee to plan workshops and forums for the upcoming year. To date workshops have been planned for family recording programs - Family Tree Maker and Legacy; Scanning Your Old Photos for CD burning and African-American Genealogy to be taught by Pam Cooper. Last year's forums for New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Pennsylvania were very successful and can be repeated this year should there be sufficient interest and others depending on survey results. The Irish, Polish, Swedish, Ontario and Writing GIGs continue with the Italian GIG starting this month.

**Membership:** Marcia Eyberse reported 42 members and 2 guests attending and that current membership is 208.

**Public Relations:** Suzy Bromwell stated that we are having success with our publicity with coverage by NPR and the Press Journal regarding the Craft Fair. She has submitted material to the Hometown News, Vero Life and 32963 for the Valentine Seminar. Copies of the Cultural Council Event Planner with our Society ad on page 20 were distributed. Last week she attended a media fair represented by 10 media outlets.

**Newsletter Editor:** Pam Cooper stated the newsletter will be 8 pages next month due to inserts. She asked that members contribute items for Cousin Connect and Serendipity with the advantage that PERSI will index the names. When attendees were asked about the possibility of receiving the newsletter via computer and a possible \$10.00 membership fee reduction, most were in favor of doing it. Pam said the board would continue discussing the feasibility of pursuing the idea. A DNA display created by Ellen Stanley is by the elevator on the library second floor. Pam noted that [Footnote.com](http://Footnote.com) now has an interactive website for the

Social Security Death Index and has just put Nebraska Homestead Applications on its site. All other applicable states will be added. [Ancestry.com](http://Ancestry.com) has also made the 1900 census interactive. The Beginning Genealogy class begins October 20, 2008. Pam expressed dismay that the Press Journal will not run the announcement until October 19. Volunteers are needed to help indexing eight years of the Sebastian Sun newspaper and to help with the reorganization of the vertical files.

**Postcard Committee:** Nancy Garvey showed a copy of our latest royalty check and announced our net profit to date is \$2,842.06. The latest presentation of the book was at the Vero Beach High School Reunion Class 1948-51 and McKee Botanical Gardens. Several additional presentations have been scheduled.

**Website:** Phil Wright has been working on our e-mail member capability. He urged members to go to the society website, [membership@IRGS.org](mailto:membership@IRGS.org), for news as some spam filters may block messages. He announced that Jim Lacy will be the guest speaker for the Brevard Society meeting November 12 and the December 8 meeting program will be "40 Years of Genealogy in Brevard County." Bill Murphy alerted the members of a site, [military.com](http://military.com) which would be of interest to veterans and those having veterans in their family as it contains information about military units and photos.

**Program:** Cindy Davis presented the program, Reunions. She shared resource material where planning and ideas can be derived as well as a step by step list of how to plan, organize and conduct a reunion. Following her presentation, Suzy Bromwell, Aline Scott, Pam and Jim Cooper, Phil Wright and Marcia Eybersbe shared some of their family reunion experiences and tips.

Meeting adjourned at 11:45am. The next meeting will be November 18, 2008 at 9:30am.
